AMPLIFYING THE VOICE OF YOUTH

Dear Colleagues,

With the change of seasons comes the time to generate fresh ideas and explore new approaches for tackling some of our most complex issues. In that vein, this newsletter edition explores how Advancing Protection and Care for Children in Adversity (APCCA) Partners have engaged young changemakers and amplified youth voices to put the APCCA Strategic Objectives into action.

Our lead story focuses on the U.S. Government's (USG's) collaboration



with the Government of Colombia to develop a national action plan based on the findings of the Violence Against Children Survey (VACS), an evidence-based data collection tool that relies on one-on-one interviews with youth ages 13 –24 to determine when, where, and how children experience violence. With support from APCCA Partners, the Government of Colombia has been tackling these systemic issues in a manner that is replicable and scalable for other countries. The article is followed by a companion story that turns the tables on one of the VACS interviewers, asking him to describe his experience of visiting youth and the impact their stories had on him. Another story highlights a successful program in the Dominican Republic creating At-Risk Youth Networks to engage youth in shaping their own communities. Additionally, we're excited to announce USAID's new Care Leaders Council and Digital Youth Council, which will provide young people with an active role in developing solutions to issues that personally impact them. These initiatives have the power to affect real change by giving youth a seat at the table.

The USG recognizes that promoting efforts to support the holistic well-being of children, youth, and families is a fundamental component to achieving development goals across all sectors. As we continue to highlight the stories of APCCA collaboration in this and future editions of the newsletter, we hope you'll find the work informative and inspiring.

Violence Against Children Survey (VACS) in Colombia: A Model for Impact and Action

When the recently published Violence Against Children Survey (VACS) for Colombia revealed that two out of five of the country's youth had experienced violence before the age of 18, two things became very clear: immediate action had to be taken, and the Government of Colombia could not tackle it alone. Thus began a well-coordinated international effort, personally supported by the First Lady of Colombia Maria Juliana Ruiz to bring together multiple agencies in developing a plan to protect Colombia's children from further harm. Dominican Youth Tackle Gender-Based Violence

In the Dominican Republic, around 20 percent of women have had at least one child before the age of 18, making the Dominican Republic one of the countries with the highest rates of teen pregnancy in Latin America. High levels of femicide, sexual assault, and intrafamily violence impact young women across the country. Young people in the country represented more than 40 percent of homicide victims in 2018. With a \$25 million investment, USAID's At-Risk Youth Initiative has impacted the lives of more than 145,000 young people in more than 500 vulnerable neighborhoods across the Dominican Republic. Panel Discussion: How Child Protection Programming Can Prevent and Mitigate COVID-19 Impacts

The COVID-19 pandemic has caused serious risks to the safety and well-being of children, including increased risk of violence, child abuse, exploitation, and neglect; inadequate care; and psychosocial distress and trauma, all with lifelong effects. Gretchen Bachman, Lucie Cluver, Philip Goldman, Rebecca Levy, and Susan Hillis discussed how preventing and responding to risks related to child protection helps prevent and mitigate COVID-19 impacts, thus improving outcomes for children and leading to better health outcomes and economic recovery.

Panelists also identified priority areas to be considered, including integrating child protection interventions in health and other COVID-19 responses, strengthening family and caregiving environments, and strengthening existing child protection and social welfare systems, with focus on children at risk of family separation or those living outside of protective family care.

Youth Programming Assessment Tool

This Youth Programming Assessment Tool (YPAT) tool, developed by FHI 360, helps youth-serving civil society organizations (YSOs) reflect upon their own internal programming and institutional practices and identify areas for improvement. Organizations that piloted the YPAT found that it helped them consider meaningful improvements to support their youth, including: improving skills instruction, developing youth councils, and building organizational capacity with an eye towards youth.
